Delivery Modalities

- Online
 - All program courses (core and concentration)
 - All foundation courses
 - All courses are 10 weeks long
- Weekend
 - All program courses (core and concentration).

Courses meet Fridays and Saturdays in an early or late time slot every other weekend for a total of five weekends

- Daytime
 - Only available at the main campus

Courses meet on a weekday and are typically scheduled somewhere between the hours of 8:30 AM and 5:00 PM

Sequence of Course Offerings

- Core courses are offered every term at the main campus
- Concentration courses offered during sequence 2. Effective 201310 courses will be offered during sequence 1.
- INB 5849 is cross listed as INB 5839. They are both offered during the same term and modality.

Curricula Information

- 5 foundation courses required for program; ACTP 5001, ECNP 5003 (microeconomics), MKTP 5005, FINP 5008 and QNTP 5002
- All foundation courses do not need to be completed before graduate level work begins however the specific foundation class must be taken prior to the required class

Day Format

- Students can pursue a non-credit internship for personal/professional enrichment purposes
- In order to pursue an internship, student must have completed 18 credit hours and be in good academic standing
- Full details about the internship can be viewed in HS Portal via the link in the My Classes module.
- Day format 9 credits is considered full time for financial aid eligibility
- Students in the day format cannot take a class in the weekend or online formats with the exception of concentration classes
- Students typically track through the entire program with the same cohort (identified by the section code students' classes are scheduled under each term)
- Concentration courses should be taken first so as not to delay program completion

Day Format - Continued

- Students will complete a 1-credit workshop ISM 5103 and 3 0-credit workshops: MGT 5110, MGT 5111 & MGT 5112
- Students may elect to go part time in this format; if so student should try to follow the grouping of classes to avoid future scheduling conflicts

Weekend/Online

- Students can pursue a non-credit internship for personal/professional enrichment purposes.
- In order to pursue an internship, student must have completed 18 credit hours and be in good academic standing
- Full details about the internship can be viewed in HS Portal via the link in the My Classes module.
- Online & Weekend 6 credits if considered full time for financial aid eligibility
- Students in the Weekend & Online formats cannot take courses in the day format (tuition will not be assessed to a student account if the student is coded in one of these formats and registers for a day class)

Unique Program Information

Lead Professor Model

- The core classes that are common to all of the MBA programs (i.e., MGT 5015, MGT 5020, ECN 5050, ACT 5060, MKT 5070, FIN 5080, and OPS 5095) are all taught under this model
- Courses are directed by a Lead Professor whose job it is to ensure consistency across all sections of a class (and modalities).
- Individual course sections are taught by an Instructional Specialist whose job is to lead the weekly learning and provide the first line of assistance to students.
- Some Lead Professors are very involved in the teaching of courses while others work more in the background, overseeing the work on the Instructional Specialist and providing assistance as necessary and appropriate.
- All courses under the Lead Professor (LP) model, even those that are ground-based, have a Blackboard component to facilitate communication between the Lead Professor and students.
